Certificate in Christian Theology & Practice



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COURSE CONTENT

Have you ever sat in church and thought to yourself, 'I would really like to find out more about the Christian faith'? Have you ever been in conversation with someone about matters of belief and wished that you had a better skillset to explain your own relationship with God? Do you sometimes read the Bible and come away with a longing to have greater understanding of both its heritage and its message? Are you interested to discover a stronger sense of rootedness in God through a deeper appreciation of prayer and helpful spiritual practices? Do you ever find yourself wrestling with some of the complexities and more puzzling aspects of contemporary life? If you can identify with any of these questions, then the 'Certificate in Christian Theology and Practice' (CCTP) could be exactly what you need.

This course has been carefully constructed as a partnership between the Church of Ireland Theological Institute and the School of Religion, Theology and Peace Studies in Trinity College Dublin. It aims to provide the tools for a broad range of people to develop their own theological foundations, their own personal discipleship and their own readiness to serve others. Lasting for one year, the programme covers biblical studies, liturgy, spirituality and theological thinking. It has been designed to allow for either full participation in all six modules, leading to an accredited award from Trinity College, or by auditing individual modules according to particular areas of interest. The course is delivered as a blended learning opportunity which mixes online teaching with face-to-face classroom contact, and thus it promises not only a rich learning experience but also a true sense of journeying with others.

The CCTP comprises an introductory weekend, and six modules taught at certificate and diploma level over six further weekends. It is directed towards candidates seeking to deepen their exploration of discipleship, to those training as Lay Readers, and to those seeking ordination. All candidates for ordained ministry in the Church of Ireland (both stipendiary and ordained local ministry) must complete the CCTP.

The 'Fit for the Purpose' Retreat Weekend which inaugurates the programme takes place in the November prior to the commencement of the course. It combines taught sessions and discussion groups with times of reflection and worship, and explores the fullness of Christian vocation in all its dimensions. This begins with our vocation as human beings, made in the image of God, and called into life by God; continues as we follow the path of discipleship; and finds a particular focus in the life of the Church as it responds to the call to be Christ's body in the world. For some, it may be expressed in a further journey to ordained or lay ministries.

Over weekends in January and March, students undertake modules introducing the Creeds and the Old Testament. In April and June, these are followed by modules on the New Testament and on Leading of Public Worship. A module Theological Thinking is taught over the September and November weekends, together with an elective module. The two elective modules are Theological Reasoning and Critical Thinking and Spirituality and Self-Understanding.

The programme enables participants to develop a grasp of theological concepts and learn critical and reflective approaches to subjects they have already encountered practically in worship and their private devotional lives. In addition to classroom contact there will be further online engagement, both with tutors and in self-study exercises via web-based content.
